Human trafficking networks operating at the highest levels of society remain among the most difficult to prosecute and disrupt. Survivors with direct experience of exploitation connected to elite networks, specifically those linked to the Epstein and Fayed cases, will present first-hand testimony and concrete policy proposals. Their insights will address the systemic failures that enabled these networks to operate, and the structural reforms they recommend to prevent recurrence.

Hope Beryl-Green is an international force for freedom and a resilient advocate for women. A survivor of sex slavery in the Epstein ring since the age of five, Hope endured unimaginable abuse until her rescue at the age of 30. Today, she stands as a passionate abolitionist, fearlessly exposing the hidden realities of global sex trafficking and mind control.



Jen Mills began working at Harrods at 16, serving as a PA to Mohamed Fayed. She was trafficked and subjected to ongoing severe sexual abuse, as well as an attempt on her life and remained silent for many years. Now, she is speaking out to confront her past and contribute to meaningful change. She advocates for stronger safeguards, better reporting systems, and survivor-informed policies to protect others.



Lindsay Mason a survivor advocate raising awareness of sexual violence and human trafficking, focused on prevention and early detection. At 20, she worked as a PA in Mohamed Fayed's office, where she experienced sustained abuse. Her experience drives her commitment to exposing how power and silence enable exploitation in workplace environments.

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
